THE WAY IT WORKS

The ARISE program is made up of three main components: in-class instruction, group-based activities and hands-on ministry experience. We call our curriculum *The Story*. With over 250 hours of instruction, it forms the major part of the program. Classes are divided into three categories: The Story, The Telling, and Biblical Doctrines. For the hands-on portion of the program, students will be doing various forms of outreach in the community.

Our team is committed to providing a program and environment that lends itself to academic and spiritual excellence. We pour our hearts and souls into helping our students reach their full ministry potential. But we'll be the first to admit that ARISE is a little—and sometimes very—intense. During the 13 weeks, we try to include as much instruction, training, and ministry opportunity as possible without overloading our students. This is not an easy tightrope to walk, so we encourage our students to minimize distractions and maintain a healthy lifestyle so they can gain as much as possible from the training provided. Furthermore, due to the intensity of the course, students are not permitted to work or be employed while attending ARISE.

This year's ARISE program runs from **August 25 to November 21**. On-campus students should plan to move into the dormitory on August 24.

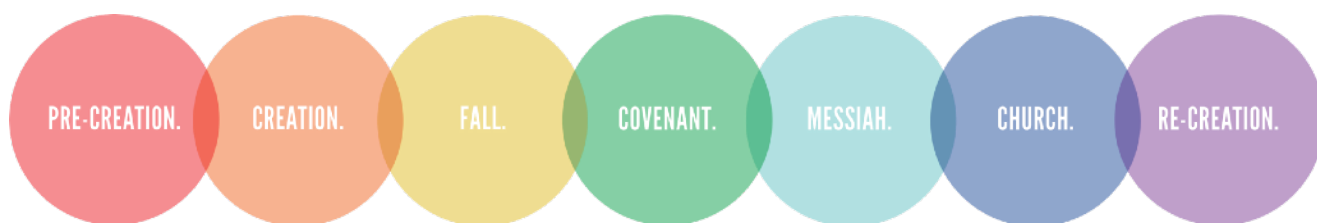
THE STORY

The Bible is the most incredible book ever written. It's full of stories, poetry, prophecies, songs, science, romance, history, and much more. However, because of this astounding diversity, we often view the Bible the same way we view a church potluck: some things look amazing, some intriguing, and some are downright scary. And we can't seem to find a common thread tying any of it together.

At ARISE, we believe the Bible isn't just a list of ethics or a collection of random stories and historical documents. Rather, it is one big story—*the story*. From Genesis to Revelation, Old Testament to New, it's a grand narrative of God redeeming humanity and revealing His character through His Son, Jesus Christ. We've titled our curriculum *The Story* because we believe the Bible is best understood when we keep this framework in mind. Seeing the Bible as a story gives us a clearer picture of who God is, what He's like, and what His plan is for the world and for each of us individually. It also gives us a clear direction and sense of place when we study the Bible. Everything in Scripture fits somewhere in the narrative.

The story also changes us experientially. As we study, the Bible reveals *our* role in the story, showing us where we've come from, where we are, and where we're going. And by extension, we learn how to teach others where they've come from, where they are, and where they're going, which is essentially what it means to be a disciple-making disciple.

We've divided *The Story* into seven chronological chapters: Pre-Creation, Creation, Fall, Covenant, Messiah, Church, and Re-Creation.



Classes that follow these chapters give our students a sweeping view of the entire Biblical narrative and make up the bulk of our instruction. Our goal during the ARISE program is to immerse our students in the story of Scripture and give them the best foundation for a life of disciple-making. It doesn't take long for our students to learn that this story is one worth telling. And by God's grace, they'll share the story with others, who will share it with others, who will share it with others.

BIBLICAL DOCTRINES

The Story also impacts our study of the Bible when it comes to doctrine. Biblical doctrines are sometimes viewed as isolated truths that are to be defended dogmatically simply because they are correct. If we're not careful, our beliefs can become weapons to prove someone else wrong. But in the context of the story, all of our doctrines and theological teachings find their proper places in relation to the character of God. Rather than being merely a collection of truths, the story tells us that every doctrine is a window through which we can see *the Truth*.

Spread throughout the program, our Biblical Doctrines classes cover the core teachings of Scripture. Each study will be faith-affirming, Christ-centered, and thoroughly biblical. Students will be taught how to give effective Bible studies that cover the [fundamental beliefs of the Seventh-day Adventist Church](#).¹ They will also be taught how to address common difficult texts with effective answers using Scripture.

A crucial part of the Biblical Doctrines classes is Bible marking. Students will be required to mark each study in their Bibles. Although a new Bible is not a requirement, it's best to bring a Bible with no previous markings. Make sure it's one that you will want to use for years to come. Because of the extensive nature of the marking and the value of the time and effort put in, we recommend that students mark a Bible that they would feel comfortable using for years to come.

THE TELLING

When it comes to sharing the story, it's not just about what you do but how you do it. Good stories need good storytellers. That's why our curriculum includes a section of instruction we call The Telling. More practical in nature, these classes are intended to get into the real-life praxis of ministry. They cover how to actually prepare and give a Bible study, how to answer tough questions about faith, and much more. Students learn how to translate the *why* of discipleship to the *how* of disciple-making, the in-class theory to real-life experience.

OUTREACH

Ministry in the community is the heart and soul of disciple-making, and no discipleship training program would be complete without hands-on experience. The ARISE program includes weekly outreach allowing students to take their class knowledge into a real world filled with real people who have real struggles and questions. Students will be assigned outreach partners and go out in pairs. Ministry opportunities include, but are not limited to, going door-to-door, feeding the homeless, public campus ministry, community health outreach, and other events.

OTHER COMPONENTS

SCRIPTURE MEMORIZATION

During the program, ARISE students will memorize and be tested on key passages of Scripture. Please note that New King James and King James are the only versions that will be accepted. ESL students may memorize in their own language.

MORNING WORSHIPS

Morning worship is held on each class day and is a critical part of individual and class growth. Each student will prepare and share a thought for one of the morning worships.

GROUPS

Groups are weekly gatherings that give space for the life-giving, grace-filled process of being with Jesus and becoming like Him in community.

BOOK READING

Our required reading assignments are carefully designed to be engaging and informative. Once each book is completed, students will participate in a discussion of the book in assigned groups.

STUDENT LIFE

CAMPUS LIFE

LOCATION

ARISE is located on the Laurelwood Campus in Jasper, Oregon. A rural community, Jasper is a small town just outside of Eugene. The greater Eugene area has a population of over 300,000 and is about 20 minutes from campus.

Surrounded by trees, hills, and a river, the campus is set on 120 acres and includes a main classroom, dormitory, soccer field, barns, walking trails, gardens, orchards, and a river. The dormitory has segregated student rooms, common living areas, a kitchen, and cafeteria.

CAMPUS CARE

It's important to note that Milo Academy and local families share the campus with ARISE. Because of this, we ask that students show respect for the grounds and property and give space and privacy to the families living nearby. We also ask that students not pick any of the fruit or other produce grown on campus, as it does not belong to ARISE.

PERSONAL LIFE

All students are expected to live in harmony with biblical principles and to adhere to the [standards and practices of the Seventh-day Adventist Church](#).²

PERSONAL DEVOTION TIME

One of the keys to experiencing the full potential of the program is faithfulness in the area of personal devotions. Personal time spent with God enables and empowers students to experience dynamic Christianity and effective ministry.

ATTENDANCE

Students are required to attend all scheduled classes, events, and outreach projects unless other arrangements have been made and approved by the administrator beforehand. We expect students to be punctual and to show respect for instructors, staff, and fellow classmates.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

Our favorite time to spend together is the Sabbath. So students should plan to attend all worship services as part of the ARISE experience. We hope that if students haven't already found the joy of this beautiful rest, that their time spent here will deepen their Sabbath experience.

RELATIONSHIPS

All students are expected to maintain a high standard of moral purity, avoiding the appearance of evil and inappropriate attentions towards the opposite sex. Our team celebrates the gift of marriage and healthy relationships. However, due to the intensity of the ARISE program and the need to minimize distractions, students are not permitted to date or begin romantic relationships with other classmates.

ATTIRE

As a team, we not only appreciate but celebrate personality and individuality expressed in diverse styles of clothing. We simply ask that while at ARISE, students' dress be clean and modest. It should reflect the fact that we are brothers and sisters in Christ. With that in mind, we ask that students please refrain from wearing anything that is offensive, revealing, distracting, or that Grandma would raise her eyebrows at it.

For example, please do not wear any of the following clothing items: tops that show cleavage or midriff, dresses or skirts that are revealing, short shorts, or anything that is see through. In class, we ask that students not wear board or athletic shorts, or track or sweat pants. In the dorm, pajamas are not be worn outside of students' respective hallways.

DORM LIFE

ON-CAMPUS ACCOMMODATION

On-campus students will be housed in dorm rooms with one or two other students of the same gender. Each room has a sink, closets, dressers, and beds. There are community bathrooms and shower facilities for each gender. Students are responsible for keeping their living quarters neat and clean. The staff reserves the right to randomly check rooms for tidiness and general upkeep. Laundry can be done in the dorm free of charge.

OFF-CAMPUS ACCOMMODATION

The dormitory is not able to accommodate married couples or students with accompanying family members. Off-campus students must find their own accommodations in the area. These students may search online for short-term accommodations in the Springfield/Eugene area or contact us for suggested housing options. Off-campus students pay \$2,250 for tuition and lunch meals on class days. Accommodations and additional meals are not included.

MEALS

Vegan-vegetarian meals will be provided Monday through Thursday. Breakfast and lunch will be provided and eaten together on campus. Students are responsible for supper meals and all meals Friday through Sunday. A community kitchen, fridge space, and food storage area are provided in the dorm.

DUTY ROTATION

Students will participate in various daily duties and jobs to keep the dorm and facilities clean, such as meal and kitchen clean-up. These duties are an important part of the program. Students will be divided into groups and put into a rotation. These duties foster a sense of unity and responsibility.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

No toasters, microwaves, candles, incense burners, or coffee makers are to be used in the dorm rooms. We also ask that no caffeinated beverages be brought on campus (e.g., coffee, certain types of tea, energy drinks, etc.).

Under no circumstances will any illicit drugs, tobacco, alcoholic beverages, pornography, occult paraphernalia, weapons, guns of any kind, gang symbols, or any other harmful items be tolerated on campus. Discovery of any of these items may lead to immediate program dismissal, without a refund.

STUDENT DISMISSAL

ARISE reserves the right to dismiss any student, without a refund, who consistently fails to abide by the policies and guidelines described in this handbook.

APPLICATION DETAILS

THE PROCESS

ARISE accepts students who have a commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ and His Word. Due to legal reasons, we can only accept students who are at least 18 years old by the starting date of the program.

The ARISE staff will only consider and review completed applications. The application process is as follows:

1. ARISE receives your completed application.
2. Our staff will review the application and email a final decision within two weeks. If you are accepted, the email will include an invoice for your total tuition and fees.
3. A minimum deposit payment of 50% of your tuition is due no later than 60 days prior to the start of the program.
4. The final payment of your total balance is due no later than 30 days prior to the start of the program.

A completed application includes *all* of the following:

1. A completed online ARISE application form
2. Three reference forms sent directly to ARISE by the individuals that filled them out ([online preferred](#))
3. A non-refundable application fee of \$35
4. A recent photograph of yourself (part of the online application)
5. A 60 second video outlining why you want to attend ARISE. Please note that we're not asking for anything fancy.

All applications will be processed in the order in which they are received. Students will be notified in a timely manner regarding their acceptance or denial to the program. Enrollment is limited, so we encourage you to submit your application sooner than later. While we do have an application deadline, application acceptance is based on room availability and space in the class.

REFERENCES

References are to be filled out by individuals that have known you for at least six months. Reference forms filled out by immediate or extended family members will not be accepted. Due to the nature of the questions on the form, it is ideal to find individuals that have known you in a spiritual or academic setting, though it is not required (e.g., a pastor, teacher, elder/deacon, etc.). Reference forms can be completed by sending individuals the link that we provide you once you apply. Reference forms can also be mailed, faxed, or emailed directly to ARISE from the referee and must remain confidential from the prospective student.

HEALTH/MEDICAL ISSUES

Because we care deeply for the safety and best interest of the students and program, it is highly important that potential students disclose to the staff any medical or health issues that require professional attention. This includes any past, recent, or current substance abuse/addictions. Since the staff is not equipped to handle certain medical and/or health issues, a student requiring professional help may not be eligible to attend the program or, in his or her best interest, may be asked to leave the program, according to the staff's discretion.

THE MONEY PART

TUITION AND BOARD

The cost of the program is \$4,950 for on-campus students. This amount includes tuition, books, room, and breakfast and lunch on class days. For off-campus students, the program is \$2,250 which includes tuition, books, and lunch on class days. Once accepted, a minimum of 50% of tuition is due no later than 60 days prior to the start of the program. The balance is due no later than 30 days prior to the start.

NOTE: For students who apply within 60 days from the start of the program, the first half of tuition is due once they've received acceptance. This deposit reserves their place in the class. If a student applies within 30 days from the start of the program, full tuition is due once an acceptance notice is received.

TRANSPORTATION

Students with vehicles who are approved to drive for for ARISE-related activities will be reimbursed at \$.43 per mile. All vehicles must be licensed and insured. Students who need rides for non-ARISE-related activities are encouraged to help the driver cover fuel and other vehicle costs.

REFUND POLICY

All cancellations must be made in writing and mailed or emailed to ARISE no less than 14 days prior to the beginning of the program for a full refund. Partial refunds may be available up to 14 days after the program begins.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

THINGS THAT GET ASKED A LOT

HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE TO FIND OUT IF I'M ACCEPTED?

Once we receive a completed online application, application fee, and three references, we will typically review the application and email a final decision within two weeks. The longest wait is usually for reference forms, so applicants should be sure to ask their references to submit the online reference forms as soon as possible.

CAN I GET COLLEGE CREDIT FOR ATTENDING THE ARISE PROGRAM?

ARISE is not an accredited school. Therefore, we cannot guarantee college/university credit for completing the program. Although ARISE is able to issue a transcript, it is at the discretion of each receiving school whether or not the credits will be accepted for transfer. Currently, Andrews University is the only school that has officially partnered with us to accept the completion of the ARISE program for transfer credits. You must contact Andrews University for the credit amount.

AS AN INTERNATIONAL STUDENT, DOES ARISE HELP ME GET A VISA?

Since ARISE is not an accredited school, attendees of our program are not officially students from an immigration standpoint. Therefore, they do not need a special visa for international students, such as an I-20. International attendees typically apply for a visitor or tourist visa, such as a B-1 or B-2. Some countries allow their citizens to be in the United States for up to six months without requiring a visa. Prospective attendees need to contact their country's immigration office for details. At the time of acceptance, ARISE will provide international attendees with an official invitation letter, which includes dates, housing information, ARISE's address, a description of the program, etc.

HOW DOES ARISE COMPARE TO OTHER EVANGELISM SCHOOLS?

Because we have not done comparative research on any other program, the best way to see the difference between our program and any other is to compare the information (curriculum, instructors, philosophy, format, etc.) from each school. All of our information is available [on our website](#). An important thing to note is that our primary goal is not to train Bible workers, pastors, or evangelists, though some of our graduates do follow those career paths. Rather, our goal is to develop disciples and strengthen their relationships with Christ. Most of our students do not come with the purpose of going into full-time ministry. Though some feel called to full-time ministry after the program, most graduates go back to their schools, churches, and communities as lay members who have a passion to spread the gospel.

WHAT IS THE TYPICAL AGE OF THE PEOPLE IN THE PROGRAM?

We only accept students that are at least 18 years old by the time the program begins. However, there is no age limit in our program. The majority of our students are typically between 18-30, but we've also had students in their 40s, 50s, and 60s, and beyond.

WHAT IS THE TYPICAL SIZE OF A CLASS?

We usually plan our class sizes to be around 30-35 students, which allows for an ideal student-to-teacher ratio.

DOES ARISE HIRE GRADUATES OR PLACE THEM IN MINISTRY POSITIONS?

We do not hire graduates and cannot guarantee full- or part-time ministry positions elsewhere after the completion of the program. However, we occasionally receive calls from churches, conferences, or ministries with job opportunities, and these are shared with our alumni network.

DOES ARISE HAVE WORK THAT I CAN DO TO HELP PAY FOR MY TUITION?

We do not have any positions available before, during, or after the program for students. Our tuition policies state that all tuition amount must be paid before the start of the program.

CAN I WORK OR STUDY WHILE ATTENDING ARISE?

Due to the very intense schedule and the need to be focused throughout the program, students are not allowed to work or take other classes while attending ARISE.

WHAT AM I EQUIPPED TO DO AFTER THE PROGRAM?

ARISE is a discipleship training program that aims to teach the loving character of God through the biblical narrative and to give instruction on how to be an effective witness for Christ. Lord willing, this will result in our students going back to their jobs, schools, and churches as on-fire disciples for Jesus. Some graduates feel called by God to go into full-time ministry, and our program can help build a foundation for that. However, our primary goal is to equip people to be disciples in any career path they pursue or walk of life.

MAKE YOUR MOVE
